DARTMOUTH

Dartmouth Mayflower Heritage Trails lead visitors to discover Dartmouth in 1620 when the Mayflower and Speedwell were moored in the River Dart, and learn about the town's rich history over the last thousand years.

The Town Trail

1.2 km. Mostly level walk; suitable for wheelchairs and buggies

The Trail paints a colourful picture of Dartmouth in 1620, leading you around the town's historic streets and points of interest, through the centre of the medieval town and past historic Bayards Cove, where, by tradition, the *Mayflower* and *Speedwell* moored. Highlights of Dartmouth's earlier and later history are also included.

The Castle Trail

1.5 km. Some level sections and some fairly steep cl imbs

This Trail leads you from Bayards Cove to beaut if ul Warfleet Creek, an important suburb of Dartmouth in 1620, and on to St Petrox Church and Dartmouth Castle. Along the route there are beautiful river and sea views.

The Packhorse Trail


2.9 km. A steep walk downhill into town; buses available to return to the Park & Ride


This Trail guides you down one of the ancient packhorse routes into Dartmouth, leading you through a thousand years of history from the Domesday village of Townstal to the harbour of today.

All three Trails link up, and on a riverboat, you can also explore the historic River Dart from where adventurers, explorers and merchants like Sir Humphrey Gilbert of Greenway, John Davis of Sandridge, and the Shapleighs of Kingswear set sail for the new world.
